## **Discussion**

1. The department should provide the U.S. Department of Education's Project Review of the MD PROMISE Program and recommendations.

# Response

The Department of Disabilities provided the U.S. Department of Education MD Promise Project Review and recommendations to Mr. Sussman on February 6. Per his instructions, rather than reprint the entire review, we have included the MD PROMISE Action Plan (Action Plan) with today's written testimony. The Action Plan lists all of the recommendations that resulted from the U.S. Department of Education's review, the action we are taking to implement the recommendations as well as the current status.

MD PROMISE staff use this document to track progress and provide monthly updates to the U.S. Dept. of Education. The sub-committee members might be pleased to know that MD PROMISE Program continues to be one of the top performers among state grantees and was recognized in the federal project review as having a very committed leadership team and intervention staff. We have included a recent MD PROMISE Program success story for your information.

2. The department should explain the MD PROMISE Program closure process, including whether it intends to track participants and monitor progress in the future.

### Response

MD PROMISE will track participants and monitor progress until the end of the program in September, 2018. Mathematica Policy Research, the agency hired by the U.S. Social Security Administration to evaluate the program, will track participant progress until 2022.

The closure process for MD PROMISE will consist of completing a Closure Checklist for each participant. The checklist includes a requirement that each youth be linked with at least one adult State employment service provider (e.g. Division of Rehabilitation Services, Developmental Disabilities Administration, American Job Center/One-Stop) as a means to ensure a smooth transition. A copy of the Closure Checklist is included with the written testimony.
