Coppin State University Capital Funding Request

Good afternoon, Mr. Chairman, and members of the Capital Budget Subcommittee:

Coppin State University is respectfully requesting \$11.136 million dollars for our capital improvement project which will enhance the educational experience and quality of life of our university community.

Project: Coppin State University New Residence Hall

A new 350-bed residence hall is part of the approved Facilities Master Plan. Our campus data - retention, housing request - indicates there is a growing demand and need for campus housing.



Justification:

Coppin State University is an urban institution that witnesses continued demand for its on-campus housing. We are consistently at 100 percent occupancy, and because there are no suitable living alternatives near or around the university, we have routinely lost new incoming students due to this dilemma. In addition, we continue to see more Baltimore City students, adjacent to campus, request on-campus housing. This matter will be further exacerbated when our mandatory living requirement is enforced beginning Fall 2025 for incoming freshmen.

Our feasibility study consisted of meetings and interviews with key stakeholders, students, and parents, and off-campus market analysis. The analysis resulted in an estimate of over 350 beds of demand from students not currently living on campus. It impacts our retention and success rates. Students living on campus have higher GPAs, retention, and graduation rates.

Coppin State educates the highest percentage of Pell-eligible students of any Maryland 4-year college or university. At Coppin, we work hard and do more with less so we can keep our tuition as low as possible. Substantial tuition increases have a far more profound adverse effect on our students than at sister institutions. Such increases in our student population could be the difference between them starting, dropping out, or finishing their degree.

It is important to note that we are not asking to have the state fully fund the housing project. We are merely requesting state support to offset some of the cost.
