




#### **TEACHER INDUCTION PROGRAM**

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## **ADDITIONAL COMMENTS**

# The President should comment on causes for the continuing decline in students, in particular transfer students, and efforts being taken to stabilize enrollment and retain students.

TU continues to work back to its pre-pandemic normal with undergraduate enrollment. TU's Spring 2025 overall enrollment headcount is 18,076, about 50 students higher than our target. Through a strategic enrollment plan, TU has increased its applications year-over-year with record interest. Our fall 2024 cohort had a record number of applicants. And early metrics for fall 2025 show we have already eclipsed that record mark. In two of the last three years, we've brought in record first-year classes that reduces the dip in students transferring in.

Regarding transfers, TU remains one of the top destinations in Maryland for transfer students, therefore representing a substantial portion of our incoming class each year. That far exceeds other institutions. That has had a lasting impact on TU. TU is engaged in the Maryland Transfer Intensive with the Aspen Institute, and recently created the Transfer Tiger Pact, which provides seamless personalized advising and specialized support for students transferring in. TU's grassroots work with community colleges through the state includes recent memorandums of understanding with TUNE and Harford Community College, a prior partnership with CCBC, and future agreements that we are currently in discussion about with our community college partners.

# The President should comment on strategies being deployed to address budget constraints for FY2026.

TU conducted a budget reduction exercise during the Fall semester in anticipation of FY26 State budget cuts. TU will use the data provided by the executive leadership of its administrative divisions to ensure an equitable distribution of budget reductions, rather than applying a universal percentage cut across the board. As the landscape of TU's state reduction comes into focus, leadership will meet in mid-March to finalize reductions to divisions that enables TU to continue its mission in serving students and our state.

In addition, forecasted modest increases in student enrollment will create additional revenues that will assist in offsetting budget reductions. Therefore, a combination of expense reduction and revenue growth will be used to meet established budgetary targets.
